What is the CVRA?

The California Voting Rights Act is a state law that prohibits the use of At Large Election Systems in local government if there is Racially Polarized Voting.

“At Large” is defined as anything other than a system in which an elected official lives in a district, and is only elected by members of that district. Does not include “multi-member” districts.

“Racially Polarized Voting” is defined as differences in voting patterns which can be shown to be correlated to race, religion, national origin, or membership in any other protected class.

What is the CVRA?

The California Voting Rights Act takes the principles of the Federal Voting Rights Act and expands it regarding districted elections in two key ways:

While Federal law uses “majority minority” districts as a standard for vulnerability, the CVRA only requires “ability to influence.”

The CVRA requires that plaintiffs get full reimbursement for legal fees associated with any successful challenge.

What is the CVRA?

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While Federal law uses “majority minority” districts as a standard for vulnerability, the CVRA only requires “ability to influence.”

The CVRA requires that plaintiffs get full reimbursement for legal fees associated with any successful challenge. ***These can be lessened or eliminated if the district follows a strict and prompt process for districting.***

What is Districting

Definition

Districting is the initial process of creating election district boundaries.

These boundaries determine:

- Eligibility to run for office – must live within boundaries to qualify for election.
- Who votes in the election – only voters within the election district vote for their council member.

What is Districting

Definition

Districting is the initial process of creating election district boundaries.

These boundaries do not determine:

- How the district decides to govern. The district can still work to achieve goals that benefit the district as a whole rather than the interests of any single zone.
- How services or relationships between the district and the public are managed.

What is Redistricting?

Redistricting is at its core the act of equalizing population among districts. After a city districts, this occurs every ten years following the release of the decennial US Census datasets.

This is important in order to meet two requirements - one constitutional, one from Supreme Court precedent:

- *Equal Representation (14th Amendment)* - how effective any resident can be at advocating for themselves or being represented within a jurisdiction.
- *One Person One Vote* - equal ability to elect a candidate of choice.

What is the Voting Rights Act?

The Voting Rights Act is federal law that seeks to remedy racial disenfranchisement. It has two sections impacting redistricting:

Section 2 – Majority Minority Districts

Section 5 – Preclearance (inactive)

The California Voting Rights Act prohibits the use of At Large Election Systems in local government if there is Racially Polarized Voting.

What is the Voting Rights Act?

The Voting Rights Act Section 2 is enforced when a jurisdiction meets certain preconditions:

- 1) A minority group must be sufficiently large and geographically compact to comprise a majority of the district;
- 2) The minority group must be politically cohesive (it must demonstrate a pattern of voting for the same candidates, also known as “bloc voting”); and,
- 3) A majority of voters vote sufficiently as a bloc usually to defeat the minority group’s preferred candidate.

What is the Voting Rights Act?


Determining Section 2 obligation requires legal counsel and sometimes a racially polarized voting analysis.

- Does the minority population qualify under Section 2?
- Is the proposed district a sufficient remedy – is it an “effective” majority minority district?
- Is there a claim for a coalition district?
- *Without Section 2, a community of interest can still be supported but race cannot be a predominant factor in drawing lines.*

What is Gerrymandering

The Gerrymander

The term Gerrymander came from a cartoon depicting a rather serpentine looking district created by Governor Elbridge Gerry in Massachusetts.





This 2001 Senate District is a great example.







Types of Gerrymanders

The two primary types of gerrymanders are Partisan and Racial, but there are more.

Partisan Gerrymandering – current Supreme Court has determined these *non-justiciable* but some state and local laws have stepped in to ban them.

Racial Gerrymandering – courts have repeatedly found these to be unlawful.

Incumbent Gerrymandering – common in any redistricting conducted by the agency itself.

Required Redistricting Criteria

Traditional redistricting principles used throughout the country and written into state law

There are a number of criteria that are required under the FAIR MAPS Act (ranked):


- **Relatively equal size - people, not citizens**
- Contiguous – districts should not hop/jump
- Maintain “*communities of interest*”
- Easily identifiable and understandable lines, following natural and man-made boundaries
- Keep districts compact – appearance/function

Equal Population

Utilizing the US Census Decennial File

What is “equal” population has been a key subject in districting litigation.

- Population Equality is based on “People” not citizens or voters or other metrics.
- 10% deviation presumed equal. Other agencies / states have different plan deviation requirements.



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Contiguity

Two definitions for what is contiguous


Contiguity should be thought of as “literal” and “functional.”

- An area that is one whole piece is “literally contiguous.”
- An area that represents how the population functions or how people are connected is “functionally contiguous.”





Railroad tracks act as a barrier, physically separating the city with only three thoroughfares between District 5 and the rest of the city.

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Communities of Interest

Bringing like people together for representation

Communities of interest are the building blocks of election-districts. A community of interest includes ethnic and language minorities and other groups.

- Subjective
- Open-ended to be as inclusive as possible

While communities of interest may include race, it cannot be the *predominant factor* in drawing district boundaries.

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- **Keep districts compact – appearance/function**

Compactness

Determining what is “compact”


The measure of compactness can get complicated.

- Ratio of the circumference of a district and the area of a district.
- Measuring the number of distinct straight lines and the number of kinks and bends.
- Simply outlawing funny shapes.






Additional Redistricting Rules

Criteria required in the City of Healdsburg Beyond Traditional Principles

The FAIR MAPS Act adds more criteria to the process.

- Not consider Incumbents / Candidates.
- Not draw districts to advantage or disadvantage a political party.
- Hold minimum set of hearings, encourage public engagement.
- Posting of all redistricting commission information on a website that is maintained *for the next 10 years*.

Census Data

Census Files come in two parts:

Geography – the underlying framework of the data

Data – the counts of population and demographics

And they can convey different information:

Point in Time – Decennial Census

Multi-year Averages – Trends/Estimates



The Mechanics of Redistricting

Census Data

Two different datasets most commonly used in redistricting:

- PL 94-171 - the Decennial Census File
 - Census Block Geography
 - Total Population Counts for April 1, 2020, used to determine the size of each district
 - Even though we are now in 2024, we are still required to use this dataset to balance the districts.

The Mechanics of Redistricting

Census Data

The census data file the city is required to use will be slightly different:


- Statewide Prisoner Reallocation
 - California Statewide Database | UC Berkeley – adjusted population removing state prison population and reallocating them based on where they lived prior to being incarcerated.
 - This allows a more equitable redistricting.

The Mechanics of Redistricting

Census Data

Two different datasets most commonly used in redistricting:

- American Community Survey (ACS)
 - Census Block Group and Census Tract or larger geographies
 - Results in estimated data that provides more context to the Census results with demographic and socioeconomic info.
 - Provides Citizen Voting Age Population (CVAP)

Alternative Voting Options

We've heard questions about:

- **Ranked Choice Voting**
 - Allows voters to select a second and third choice
 - Not authorized for General Law cities
- **Cumulative Voting**
 - Voters receive a number of votes equal to the number of open seats. Voters can allocate all their votes to one candidate or distribute among multiple candidates
 - Unclear defensibility under CVRA
- **Citywide Single Voting**
 - Voter may cast only one vote, regardless of the number of council seats up for election

Composition and Number of Districts

Does the City Council want to move forward with a total of five districts or consider four districts and a directly elected Mayor?

- Government Code Section 34886 allows for members of the legislative body to be elected by-district or by-district with an elected mayor

Option 1:
Implement five
districts and
continue to have
the Mayor selected
by the City Council
for one-year terms

- This option is most consistent with the current practice and therefore unlikely to result in a disruptive shift in governance model or require a transition.
- The current system allows councilmembers to share the role of mayor
- Best responds to the goal of the districting process by removing barriers for candidates and increasing access.

Option 2:
Implement four
districts and a
mayor elected at-
large by the entire
community for a
term of either two
or four years

- An at-large, elected mayor is directly accountable to the voters.
- A mayor serving a longer term has greater stability in their role and an elected mayor generally enjoys more deference.
- A mayor that serves longer than one year could benefit from greater experience in the role.

Composition and Number of Districts


- **Staff seeks direction from City Council ASAP, and no later than the second public hearing**
- Important to avoid muddying the map drawing process for the public
- Five districts and council-selected mayor is considered the status quo and default option.

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Healdsburg Community Center Renaming

City Council, December 16, 2024



Requested Action

Adopt a Resolution waiving the Healdsburg Park Naming Policy and renaming the Healdsburg Community Center the "Abel De Luna Community Center".

Community Center Renaming Background

- City launched the Saggio Hills Development park naming process in September 2023.
 - 32 naming proposals with 28 unique names proposed for the park
 - Significant support for naming the park after Laura Fish Somersal and Able De Luna
- On October 21, 2024, City Council named the new park the “Laura Fish Somersal Park”
- Also unanimously directed staff to return to City Council with a resolution renaming the Healdsburg Community Center in recognition of Mr. De Luna.

Community Center Renaming

Abel De Luna Community Center

- Born in Zacatecas, Mexico, Abel moved to Juarez, Chihuahua with his family as a child
- When he finished high school, he decided to go to the United States with his father, relocating to Calistoga where Abel's brother lived
- The DeLuna family worked in agriculture, picking grapes, pears and prunes
- After his English improved, Abel became a community aide in the Office for Economic Opportunity in Napa
- Abel and his wife Emilia, a beautician, moved to Healdsburg after they were married in 1970



Community Center Renaming

Abel De Luna Community Center

- In 1972, the De Luna's opened La Luna Market (on Center Street where Casa del Mole is located)
- From 1978 - 1987, Mr. DeLuna operated the Aven Theater, a movie theater, on North Street; featuring regular Spanish language films as well as first-run English language films
- Mr. DeLuna has continued to expand as an entrepreneur
 - Buying and operating multiple radio stations and DJ work
 - Forming Luna Music Co. and Luna Management Co.
 - Senior VP at Sony



Community Center Renaming

Abel De Luna Community Center

- Abel De Luna was a respected and influential business, community and civic leader in Healdsburg during the 1970s and 80s
- Mr. De Luna became the first Mexican-American elected to the Healdsburg City Council, in March 1976
- Served as Mayor from March 1978 to April 1980.
- At age 31, Abel became the youngest and the first Latino Mayor of Healdsburg



Recommended Action

- Adopt a Resolution appointing a Commissioner and Alternates to the Northern California Power Agency (“NCPA”), the Transmission Agency of Northern California (“TANC”) and the Lodi Energy Center’s Project Participants Committee (“LEC PPC”) and rescinding all previous appointments.

NCPA/TANC Appointments

- The City of Healdsburg is an active member of the Northern California Power Agency (NCPA), Transmission Agency of Northern California (TANC), and the Lodi Energy Center Project Participants Committee (LEC PPC) which were established through JPAs to primarily procure power and transmit same for the City.
- As members of these Agencies, the City of Healdsburg is entitled to have representation on the Commissions that oversee the Agencies. The appointments require formal action by City Council resolution.
- Staff recommends that, in addition to the appointed Council members, the City Manager and Utility Director also be appointed as Alternates to the NCPA, TANC, and LEC PP Commissions/Committee and that the NCPA General Manager be appointed as Alternate to the TANC Commission.
- The proposed resolution provides for these proposed Primary and Alternate appointments and also rescind existing appointments and resolutions.

Arts and Culture Commission Appointment

- The Arts and Culture Commission was recently established a few months ago. Staff recommends adding a Council liaison to the Arts and Culture Commission.



- Adopt a Resolution appointing a Commissioner and Alternates to the Northern California Power Agency (“NCPA”), the Transmission Agency of Northern California (“TANC”) and the Lodi Energy Center’s Project Participants Committee (“LEC PPC”) and rescinding all previous appointments.
