

## BACKGROUND

The City of Healdsburg currently employs an at-large elections system, in which voters of the entire City elect the five City Council members. A district-based election is one in which the City is divided into separate districts, each with one City Council member who resides in the district and is chosen by the voters in that particular district. Once the transition away from at-large elections is completed, the district-election system will be phased in beginning with the 2026 election.

In October of 2024, the City of Healdsburg received a challenge alleging a violation of the California Voting Rights Act (the "CVRA") and threatening litigation if the City declines to voluntarily change to a district-based election system for electing Councilmembers. On November 18, 2024 the City Council adopted a resolution of intent in order to take advantage of the safe harbor provisions of the Elections Code and declaring Healdsburg's intent to transition from at-large election to district-based elections.

The City of Healdsburg wants to hear from the community on how district boundaries should be drawn. Share your opinions by answering a few short but impactful questions:





## JOIN THE CONVERSATION

The City Council will take the public's submissions into account when the first draft maps are developed. Beginning February 18, 2025, the public will be able to review and provide comments on these draft maps. Subsequent drafts will be made available for public review as the transition progresses.





## PROCESS

The City will hold two initial public hearings on December 16, 2024 and January 6, 2025, at which the public is invited to provide input regarding the composition of the districts. While the public can begin drawing maps, official maps can not be drawn by the City before completion of these two public meetings. Then, the hired demographer can begin to officially draw maps that will be considered in the districting process along with any maps submitted by the public. The City would then hold two additional hearings, at which the public is invited to provide input regarding the content of the draft maps and the proposed sequence of elections. Once a map is selected, it would need to be published at least seven days before consideration at a hearing for introduction of an ordinance to adopt the district map. In addition to the public hearings, we will hold a community workshop on January 16, 2025, to answer questions, receive feedback, and give the public a chance to draw maps.
