RECOMMENDED ACTION(S):

Pass an Ordinance Amending Healdsburg Municipal Code Article 1 (General Provisions) within Chapter 2.40 (Elections) of Title 2 (Administration and Personnel) to add section 2.40.010.01 “District Elections” to Provide for the Election of Members of the City Council by Five Districts; Establish the District Boundaries; and Election Order of Each District.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/OUTREACH:

Outreach for this effort includes posting on social media channels, including Facebook, Instagram and Nextdoor. The City has also shared information on the City’s website and in the bi-weekly City Manager’s Update. Informational pamphlets have been distributed to each City facility in English and Spanish as well as an insert that was included in the December utility bills. A dedicated webpage has been created on the City’s website at <https://healdsburg.gov/1152/Transition-to-District-Elections>. Information is available to the public with background information about the districting process, upcoming hearing dates, and supporting documents. This webpage is being continuously updated with dates and locations where community members can share their feedback on this issue. The website also features a virtual mapping tool which community members have been utilizing to draw their own district boundaries and a feature allowing submission of community interest forms. Information will be provided in both English and Spanish. The City held a community meeting on January 16, 2025 at the Community Center, met with the senior community on January 24, 2025 at the Senior Center and the City Manager held a meeting with the Spanish-speaking community on January 28, 2025 to gather feedback on the process. The City has partnered with Corazón Healdsburg to

assist with the outreach to the Spanish-speaking community. Both public hearings and community meetings will continue to include live interpretation services.

BACKGROUND:

On October 3, 2024, the City received a letter from a potential plaintiffs' attorney, Shenkman & Hughes PC, alleging a violation of the CVRA and threatening litigation unless the City voluntarily transitions to a district-based election system for electing Councilmembers. On November 18, 2024, the City Council adopted a resolution declaring the intent to transition to District-Based elections. Elections Code section 10010(e)(3)(B) and (C) provides that if a legislative body adopts a resolution of intent, a prospective plaintiff may not commence an action within ninety (90) days of the resolution of intention's passage unless that date is extended in writing by the parties. In this case, the prospective plaintiff's attorney agreed to allow the City of Healdsburg a sixty (60) day extension and the initial Tentative Timeline submitted to the Council identified April 17, 2025 as the deadline for the transition. Since then, Staff confirmed with the prospective plaintiff's attorney that an additional thirty (30) day extension is acceptable and thus the new deadline to complete the transition to district based elections is by May 17, 2025.

The City conducted the initial two public hearings on December 16, 2024 and January 6, 2025. At the first and second public hearings, the Council received a report from the City's demographer, Redistricting Partners, about the basics of the districting process and identifying communities of interest. Upon completion of the first and second public hearings, the City was required to hold at least two additional hearings over a period of no more than 45 days, at which the public was invited to provide input regarding the content of the draft maps and the proposed sequence of elections.

The City held the third public hearing on February 18th at which both the public and the City Council provided feedback on the draft maps. Members of the public had the opportunity to submit maps with four, five or six districts over the course of the last ten weeks.

At the fourth public hearing on March 17, 2025, the community and the City Council considered the draft maps moved forward from the third public hearing, as well as the community-submitted maps. All of the maps are available on the City's website: <https://healdsburg.gov/1152/Transition-to-District-Elections>. The maps that have been submitted by members of the public through the City's "Districtr" mapping tool are identified by a numerical identification number (e.g., ID 277459)," and the maps that have been prepared by Redistricting Partners are identified by a letter (e.g., Draft Map A).

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

On April 7, 2025, the City Council held a fifth public hearing where they considered Draft Map A as the basis for an ordinance. Following discussion, the Council elected not to approve Draft Map A and instead selected Draft Map D as the foundation for the ordinance.

On April 21, 2025, the City Council held a sixth public hearing and selected Draft Map D as the foundation for the ordinance and selected sequencing of Districts (Districts 2 and 4 would be elected in 2026 and 1, 3 and 5 would be elected in 2028), and then introduced the ordinance. At this meeting the Council would pass the ordinance.

Within 21 days of adopting final election district boundaries, the City Council will be required to issue a report that explains the basis on which it made its decisions in achieving compliance with the requirements and criteria of the Fair Maps Act, including, as to each neighborhood, community of interest, city, or census designated place that was split into two or more districts, the reason for that split.

Proposed Ordinance

The proposed Ordinance would amend Article 1 (General Provisions) within Chapter 2.40 (Elections) of Title 2 (Administration and Personnel) to add a new section 2.40.010.01 “District Elections” within the Municipal Code. The proposed Ordinance would provide for the election of Councilmembers by establishing five districts and identify the district boundaries by including the map selected by the Council in the ordinance. The proposed Ordinance would also specify that the commencement of the district elections shall be in the next general municipal election in 2026 and provide for two seats being elected in 2026 and three seats in 2028 to ensure all incoming and currently seated Councilmembers’ do not have shortened terms. Finally, the Proposed Ordinance authorizes Redistricting Partners to make non-substantive, technical adjustments to the map as necessary to prepare a GIS shapefile, which will be submitted to the County of Sonoma by the City Clerk.

ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP:

Not applicable.

ALTERNATIVES:

The City Council could choose not to move adopting Draft Map D. If this alternative is selected, staff requests further direction in terms of additional analysis requested or an alternative map to include in an ordinance for consideration at a future public hearing.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is a fiscal impact due to the costs associated with the transition to District-based elections. Costs include the demographer, which are estimated to be less than \$50,000, \$10,000 to the County of Sonoma, legal costs, and payment of the plaintiffs’ attorney costs of \$33,000. The City Council appropriated a total of \$100,000 for this effort at a prior meeting

ENVIRONMENTAL ANALYSIS:

This item does not constitute a project as defined by the California Environmental Quality Act (Public Resources Code § 21000, et seq.) (CEQA) as the adoption of the resolution does not have the potential to result in either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment (14 Cal. Code Regs. § 15378).

ORDINANCE NO. ____

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEALDSBURG AMENDING HEALDSBURG MUNICIPAL CODE ARTICLE 1 (GENERAL PROVISIONS) WITHIN CHAPTER 2.40 (ELECTIONS) OF TITLE 2 (ADMINISTRATION AND PERSONNEL) TO ADD SECTION 2.40.010.01 “DISTRICT ELECTIONS” TO PROVIDE FOR THE ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL BY FIVE DISTRICTS; ESTABLISH THE DISTRICT BOUNDARIES; AND ELECTION ORDER OF EACH DISTRICT

WHEREAS, members of the City Council are currently elected in “at-large” elections, in which each City Councilmember is elected by the registered voters of the entire City; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 34886, in certain circumstances, authorizes the legislative body of a city of any population to adopt an ordinance to change its method of election from an “at-large” system to a “district-based” system in which each councilmember is elected only by the voters in the district in which the candidate resides; and

WHEREAS, on October 3, 2024, the City of Healdsburg (“City”) received a certified letter from a potential plaintiffs’ attorney, alleging a violation of the California Voting Rights Act (the “CVRA”) and threatening litigation if the City declines to voluntarily change to a district-based election system for electing Councilmembers; and

WHEREAS, while the City Council denies that the City’s at large election system violates the CVRA or any other provision of law, the City Council determined that the public interest is better served by initiating a process for transition to a district-based election system and thereby avoiding the high costs associated with defending a lawsuit under the CVRA; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 34886 permits the City Council of any city to change the City’s method of election by ordinance to a “by-district” system in which each member of the City Council is elected only by the voters in the district in which the candidate resides; and

WHEREAS, Elections Code Section 10010 provides a method whereby a jurisdiction can expeditiously transition to a district-based election system and thereby avoid the high cost of litigation under the CVRA if the jurisdiction complied with the “safe harbor” provisions of Elections Code Section 10010; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of California Elections Code section 10010(a)(1), a city that changes from an at-large city council method of election to a by-district city council method of election is required to hold at least two public hearings over a period of not more than 30 days,

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at which the public is invited to provide input regarding communities of interest that would help to define the composition of the districts; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of California Elections Code section 10010(a)(2), a city that changes from an at-large election system to by district must, after the first and second public hearings hold at least two additional hearings over a period of no more than 45 days, at which the public is invited to provide input regarding the content of the draft maps and the proposed sequence of elections. A fifth public hearing would be held to adopt the selected map; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of California Elections Code section 10010(e)(3)(C), a city may enter into an agreement with a prospective plaintiff to extend the time periods to transition; and

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting held on November 18, 2024, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 134-2024 to begin the process of transitioning to a district-based election system and adopting the timeline for public hearings to conform to the requirements of California Elections Code section 10010; and

WHEREAS, the City did enter into a written agreement to extend the time period by which the City could transition to district based elections by an additional sixty days; and

WHEREAS, at regular meetings held on December 16, 2024 and January 6, 2025, pursuant to California Elections Code section 10010(a)(1), the City Council held public hearings where the public was invited to provide input regarding the number and composition of the City's voting districts and election sequencing, before any draft maps were drawn, and the City Council considered public input and discussed the same at those meetings; and

WHEREAS, thereafter, at regular meetings on February 18, 2025 and March 17, 2025, pursuant to California Elections Code Section 10010(a)(2), the City Council held public hearings where the public was invited to provide input regarding the content of the draft maps that had been released at least seven (7) days before each meeting, and the proposed sequence of elections, and the City Council received, considered and discussed the same; and

WHEREAS, at the regular meeting on April 7, 2025, at the conclusion of the public hearing, the Council formally selected the voting districts identified in "DRAFT MAP D", attached to and incorporated herein as Exhibit A to this Ordinance (referred to hereafter as "Map D"), and an election sequence described herein, and introduced this Ordinance for a first reading at that time with a second reading and adoption scheduled to take place on April 21, 2025, and

WHEREAS, throughout the foregoing process, the City engaged in a significant amount of public outreach and engagement above and beyond the public procedures required by California Elections Code Section 10010 and those portions of the Fair and Inclusive Redistricting for Municipalities and Political Subdivisions (Fair Maps) Act applicable to cities that are transitioning for the first time to district-based elections systems; and

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WHEREAS, such outreach included but is not limited to, maintaining a City website dedicated to the process of transitioning from at-large elections to by district elections, regularly notifying residents of meetings and other engagements on the City's social media channels, posting and publishing notices about the public; distribution of informational pamphlets at each City facility in English and Spanish as well as an insert that was included in the December utility bills; and

WHEREAS, the City held a community meeting on January 16, 2025 at the Community Center, met with the senior community on January 24, 2025 at the Senior Center and the City Manager held a meeting with the Spanish-speaking community on January 28, 2025 to gather feedback on the process; and

WHEREAS, the City has partnered with Corazón Healdsburg to assist with the outreach to the Spanish-speaking community conducting public hearings and community meetings with live interpretation services; and

WHEREAS, in selecting the map, the City Council considered the criteria set forth in Elections Code Section 21130 of the Fair Maps Act and is adopting district boundaries in accordance with the provisions stated therein, as well as the federal Voting Rights Act and the California Voting Rights Act; and

WHEREAS, Map D meets all the requirements of state and federal law and was posted on November 8, 2024 on the City's website for public consideration at least seven (7) days before the introduction of this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this Ordinance is to enact, pursuant to California Government Code section 34886, an ordinance providing for the election of members of the City Council of the City of Healdsburg by district in five single-member districts as reflected in Exhibit A to this Ordinance and to implement the guarantees of the California Constitution.

NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEALDSBURG DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recitals. The City Council hereby finds that the foregoing recitals are true and accurate and are incorporated herein by reference.

Section 2. California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Determination. Adoption of this Ordinance is exempt from environmental review as the adoption of this Ordinance does not qualify as a "project" pursuant to Public Resource Code section 21065 and CEQA Guidelines Sections 15320, 15378 and 15061(b)(3) since it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that adoption of the Ordinance would cause either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment.

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Section 3. Code Amendment. Article 1 (General Provisions) within Chapter 2.40 (Elections) of Title 2 (Administration and Personnel) is hereby amended to add section 2.40.010.01 “District Elections,” within Article 1 to read as follows:

“Section 2.40.010.01- District Elections.

A. Declaration of Purpose. The City Council of the City of Healdsburg hereby declares that the change of method of electing members of this Council, hereby enacted, is being made in furtherance of the California Voting Rights Act.

B. City Council Districts Established. Five City Council districts are hereby established in the City of Healdsburg. The district boundaries and identifying number of each district shall be as described on the Council District Map D, attached hereto as Exhibit “A” and incorporated hereby by this reference and incorporated below.

[SELECTED MAP]

C. Election of Members of the City Council by District.

1. Following the effective date of this ordinance and upon the commencement of “by district” elections pursuant to section 2.40.010.01(D), members of the City Council shall be elected “by district,” as defined in California Government Code Section 34871, or any successor statute.

2. Registered voters signing nomination papers or voting for a member of the City Council shall be residents of the geographical area making up the district from which the member is to be elected.

3. No term of any member of the City Council that commenced prior to the effective date of this ordinance shall be affected by the adoption of this ordinance.

D. Commencement of District Elections. Commencing with the general municipal election in November of 2026 and every four years thereafter the voters in districts [2] and [4] shall elect members of the City Council by district for full four (4) year terms. At the general municipal election in 2028 and every four years thereafter, the voters in districts [1], [3], and [5] shall elect members of the City Council by district for full four (4) year terms.”

Section 4. Authorization for Technical Adjustments. The City’s demographer, Redistricting Partners, is hereby authorized to make non-substantive technical adjustments to Map D to finalize the Map as necessary and to prepare a GIS shapefile which identifies the Council district boundaries, as well as the census blocks and tracts. The final Map D, the census blocks and tracts and the GIS shapefile shall be in a form approved by the City Clerk and City Attorney.

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Section 5. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall nonetheless remain in full force and effect. The Council of the City of Healdsburg hereby declares that it would have adopted each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions of this Ordinance be declared invalid or unenforceable.

Section 6. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after adoption as provided by Government Code section 36937.

Section 7. Publication; Certification.

The City Clerk shall attest to the adoption of this Ordinance and cause the same to be published in accordance with State law. The City Clerk is also authorized and directed to file this Ordinance, Map D, the census blocks and tracts, the GIS shapefile, and any other documents necessary to effectuate the adoption of Map D with the Sonoma County Clerk-Recorder-Assessor-Registrar of Voters. In the case of any parcels that are split across Council district boundaries, the Sonoma County Clerk-Recorder-Assessor-Registrar of Voters shall apply a uniform methodology to adjust the boundary line to a border of the parcel without materially affecting the population within each affected district.
